FrameWorks is on a mission...


to advance the nonprofit sector's capacity to frame the public discourse on social issues.


Frames are sets of choices about how information is presented:


What to emphasize








Use Narrative #1 (*Embracing the Dynamic*) to tell a new story about <u>aging</u>

Narrative #1: Embracing the Dynamic



How does this work?



Ingenuity: Let's use innovation to re-envision aging in the US.

Testing Embracing the Dynamic



Studies show that Experience Corps works. After one year, many students who work with Experience Corps volunteer tutors achieve as much as 60% improvement in critical literacy skills compared to their peers. Volunteers provide an average of 6-15 hours of support each week throughout the school year.

The Experience Corps approach is simple, but effective. As an anti-poverty strategy, AARP Foundation Experience Corps is helping to provide both older adults and children with opportunities to enrich their lives through literacy.

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Experience Corps offers an innovative way to harness an aging community's potential. Volunteers are older adults who provide tutoring to students each week. After one year in the program, many students improve their critical literacy skills by as much as 60%. By tapping into the talents and energy of older adults, the Corps helps people of all ages to thrive.


Narrative #2: *Confronting Injustice*





The **Confronting Injustice** Narrative Putting ageism on the map


How does this work?



Justice: A just society treats people of all ages equally, and ensures that everyone has meaningful opportunities to contribute.

Solutions: We need to address ageism head on. We can do this, e.g., by having better workplace rules and systems, trainings to combat implicit bias, and ways to report problems.

What can we do about it?



A three-step explanation of ageism



Define ageism. Be sure to use a definition that makes room for people to see structural causes and consequences.



Follow up with a concrete example that shows how ageism is a serious problem requiring a public response. The example of workplace discrimination is readily understood and highly effective in prompting people to think about ageism as a public issue; health care discrimination also works well.



Explain implicit bias to show the public that there is a place for intervention: ageism arises from a common process that works automatically, but it can be disrupted.

Definition + Example + Explanation

A just society is inclusive of all of its members. Yet, we often fail to treat older people as equal participants. Ageism — discrimination based on negative assumptions about age – 1 has a big impact on older people's live. Take the workplace: Employers commonly use agebased assumptions to evaluate resumes, without even realizing they are doing it. This "implicit bias" makes employers less likely to interview job candidates whose graduation dates indicate they're 50 or older.

When the skills and contributions of our society's most experienced workers are not realized, everybody loses out. Fortunately, once we know about these unintentional biases, we become less likely to make "snap judgments" and more likely to treat people fairly regardless of age. We can also change our practices, for example by not requiring that resumes contain ageidentifying information, or by offering bias-prevention trainings. Taking these steps will not only decrease ageism in the workplace, but also lead to a more inclusive, just society for us all.



How does this work?




• Justice: A just society keeps older people connected to our communities so we can prevent and address elder abuse.
